Hi there,

As I've only been in post, as the new Hospice CEO, for a short time, I thought I'd share some information about myself and what I've discovered at the hospice during the past 12 weeks... which have flown by!

I've come to the hospice, after 5 years of being the concurrent CEO of two Hospices based in Northumberland, that provided end of life care in the patient's own home. This was necessitated by the very rural nature of Northumberland and the difficulties that would have been experienced by loved ones, having to travel many miles to visit an inpatient unit.

I've learned an incredible amount about the hospice and in particular the amazing people who work, volunteer and donate to us.

The services provided by Teesside Hospice: palliative end of life care; wellbeing; lymphoedema care; bereavement support, have been directly supported by you and the wider community.

I've been incredibly impressed with the compassion, professionalism, dedication and commitment to the cause, from everyone I've met.

Many of our services, particularly our shops, rely on the regular support of wonderful volunteers who give up their time freely on a weekly basis and without whom the hospice just couldn't function.

Without the support of all of these individuals and the contributions made by our incredibly generous donors, the challenge of raising over £6M per year to keep the hospice running would be insurmountable and many people who need our support would miss out, at a vital time in their lives.

Additionally we have to navigate other challenges taking place in the world around us, which have a

direct and indirect impact on the hospice. Nurses and doctors are in short supply; although the economy has improved recently the cost of living is still higher than analysts would like and impacting on the quality of life of many of us; wars in other parts of the world continue to increase the costs of many household necessities and bills; funding from the NHS is still well below that required to cover all of our costs.

Work is ongoing with our NHS colleagues to try to redress this issue and a recent acknowledgement that further funding will be forthcoming has been gladly received. However, we don't know how much this will be. Consequently, in spite of the incredible work done by our teams that generate income, we expect to overspend by approximately £350,000 this year.

It costs us over £16,000 per day to run the hospice and provide all of our services to vulnerable people that need us.

As a charitable hospice, we can only survive with the support of our community – without you, we wouldn't exist. Thank you for everything you do for the hospice and ultimately those who we support on a daily basis. Your contribution is immeasurable.

I hope you enjoy the newsletter and please, if you can, support us – volunteer, sign up for an event, donate items to a shop, or just pop into the Northgate Tea Room – any help you can offer would be amazing!

"My name's Ann and I'm from Middlesbrough originally. I worked for a doctor's surgery for the last 20 years which I've absolutely loved. However, I'm 70 now, so at 68 I decided it was time to retire, which I have done. Unfortunately as I've retired, the blooming big C came back.

Unfortunately in 2016, I went with a pain in the same side that I had already had done, but the very clever nurse looked at the other side and decided that it wasn't right.

I've come here because I got pretty well down in just 2 weeks, everything seemed to crumble. I didn't know which way was up, and I started to go to the crafts club in Redcar. We don't have to come here to the hospice, people who live in Redcar, we have our own little group that we can go to which is fantastic. It's on a Monday, it's just 2 hours but it's absolutely lifesaving. I live on my own, and I went there and talked to other people and straight away I felt better. The girls and staff who run it are just out of this world. There's a nurse, a crafter and a lady who gives massages, and honestly it's just a little bit of heaven.

Without going there, I wouldn't be here now, because I stopped going, and they knew there was something wrong with me not going, so they kept ringing me saying are you alright Ann? I kept fibbing really and saying yes I'm fine, but really I wasn't fine.

One nice thing was, we have hand massages and arm massages, and they've managed to get a special chair, so that we feel as though we are in the same treatment as everybody else. Before, we sat on a wooden chair with a pillow, but now we've all got a special chair that they bring with them which makes us feel special, and this is where the money goes- it's a small thing but it means so much to us.

The only way I can describe my experience here is that it is heaven on earth here at the hospice. It's a privilege that I feel to be here and it truly is a home from home."

"Half of me is gone, half of me is left, and I'm having to learn to live with that half that's still here"

We spoke with Gloria as she shared her experience of losing her husband, Harry, in 2022. Gloria was introduced to the bereavement counselling service offered at Teesside Hospice and wanted to share her thoughts on how counselling can support your grieving process.

"My names Gloria, and Harry, my husband, passed away in 2022. He was in the hospice twice to have his medication sorted, and so I knew about the bereavement service when Harry died. I didn't apply, because I felt ashamed that I couldn't cope, and that I needed support. But it got to a point where I felt I needed to do this, so I applied and was given an hour a week.

The first two weeks I just cried all the time for the first two sessions, but that was fine. My counsellor was wonderful, she sat and just let me. One of the first questions my counsellor asked me was how do I feel about being here? And I told her I felt ashamed, disappointed in myself that I couldn't cope and that I'd had to come for help. She said no, you're on the winning side, you've admitted you need help and that's winning it's not losing.

At the end of it, you're told that the door is always open here for you whether it be one year, two years, three years, they will always be here for you to come back if you need to come back. That in itself is really reassuring, because I know that's a lifeline to me. If ever I need to come back, I can come back knowing that I'm going to be helped and I'm going to be supported."

Last year, our team of experienced counsellors supported 271 children and adults in bereavement, providing specialist support to people just like Gloria.

"The people here are wonderful, so don't not come because you're feeling silly or disappointed in yourself. If you need help you need it, just admit it and come. It's the best thing that can happen to you.

After the first couple of weeks, I started to look forward to coming and to see Tara, because I knew she wouldn't condemn me, she wouldn't give me rules and regulations. A lot of people don't know what to say to you when you've lost somebody that close. They say things like "well you've just got to get on with it," or "think about all of the nice times you've had," or "you're lucky to have had him." Yes those things are nice, but they're not helpfulwhen you are so deep in grief. You're best to just not say anything and just hug the person, and say it will get better in time.

It does take time, it takes forever. I'll never be the same person. I know that because half of me is gone, half of me is left, and I'm having to learn to live with that half that's still there. I still find it hard, I still cry a lot, I still miss my husband immensely, but those sessions have helped me to get where I am now."

1,182 hours of counselling was provided to our bereavement clients over the past year, helping people learn to walk alongside their grief. "I feel I belong here now, I can come anytime and know that I'll be welcome. One day, I want to be a volunteer in some area of the hospice, to put back in what I've got out. Because it's not about taking, it's about giving all of the time, and I want to give back into this service that has helped me so immensely."

"It's one of the most fulfilling volunteer roles I have done in my life."

At Teesside Hospice, we believe in providing comprehensive support to our patients, staff, and carers, encompassing not only physical care but also emotional and mental wellbeing. One of the ways we do this is through reiki, a specialised form of complementary therapy. Reiki is a holistic approach that combines various techniques such as massage, aromatherapy, and relaxation exercises to promote overall wellness. Here's what Ama has to say about her role in the complimentary therapy team:

"Hi, I'm Ama, I'm a volunteer here at Teesside Hospice working as part of the complementary therapy team, to provide reiki to staff, patients and carers. I have volunteered here at the hospice for over a year now, and have found it to be one of the most fulfilling roles I have done in my life. It's wonderful to be of service and support to those who need it.

I've been a reiki therapist for around 15 years now, and discovered reiki, and the world of energy, whilst living in London. Reiki is quite a difficult therapy to explain, but it's working with the energies of the body, to enable you to feel relaxed and peaceful. When your energetic body is in flow, you feel so much better and aligned in all that you do.

When providing reiki to patients, I find that they often fall into a very deep, relaxed state. They find themselves falling asleep on occasions, and when the session finishes, they often find that they are very relaxed, very calm, very peaceful and sometimes they even see colours, and feel warm from my hands from providing the reiki."

Ensuring our patients are relaxed and comfortable is paramount to their well-being and quality of life during their time at Teesside Hospice. A relaxed and

comfortable state can reduce stress and anxiety, enhance the effectiveness of medical treatments, and foster a sense of dignity and control for our patients.

"The feedback from patients when they have received reiki, has been incredibly positive. They've enjoyed the experience and felt very relaxed, very peaceful, and very content at the end of it. It is a therapy I would highly recommend to anybody and everybody."

In addition to reiki therapies, our Wellbeing Team at Teesside Hospice offers a range of complementary therapies aimed at addressing various aspects of our patients' needs. One of our offerings is acupuncture group sessions, designed to alleviate difficult symptoms of stress and anxiety through the practice of acupuncture.

Another invaluable resource is our 'Self-Help Using Complementary Therapy' program, a five-week group session led by experienced therapists. During these sessions, patients learn practical techniques such as acupressure, aroma sticks, reflexology, Indian head massaging, and relaxation exercises. Empowering patients with these self-care tools not only provides immediate relief but also equips them with skills to manage their symptoms independently.

Furthermore, our 'My Space' group sessions provide a sanctuary for patients to explore various relaxation, mindfulness, and visualisation techniques. These sessions offer a supportive environment where patients can discover what works best for them in promoting inner peace and emotional well-being.

At Teesside Hospice, we go beyond traditional medical care, offering a holistic approach to meet our patients' diverse needs.
